A Slight Issue with CIE RGB Color Space



"Issue": Some colors are expressed in negative RGB values, which is mathematically OK but not very intuitive.

Goal: design a color space so that all colors have positive values.

How? Transforming the coordinate system so that all colors are in the positive quadrant.



CIE RGB to XYZ Color Space Transformation $\begin{bmatrix} X \\ Y \\ Z \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} R_x, G_x, B_x \\ R_y, G_y, B_y \\ R_z, G_z, B_z \end{bmatrix} \times \begin{bmatrix} R \\ G \\ B \end{bmatrix}$ CIE in 1931 constructed the XYZ color space for that purpose. Every [R, G, B] value of a color is transformed to a [X, Y, Z] value.

Chromaticity and Gamut



Scaling the Intensity of a Light

If we double the power of a light, intuitively its "color" doesn't change. It just becomes brighter.

Doubling the power of a color [x, y, z] gets us another color [2x, 2y, 2z]. Both colors have the same **ratio** of the primary contributions. They lie on the same line that goes through the color space origin.





Separating Intensity From "True" Color

Another color, say, [0.5x, 2y, 3z], has different primary contributions, and is not simply scaled from the color [x, y, z].

Goal: separate the objective quantity (intensity) and the **quality** of a color.





Chromaticity

Normalize **XYZ** to **xyz**.

 $x = \frac{X}{X + Y + Z}$ xyz are called the chromaticity, the "objective" quality" of the color. • Can extract chromaticity in any color space by the $y = \frac{Y}{X + Y + Z}$ same calculations. $z = \frac{Z}{X + Y + Z}$ It's just a geometric transformation from [X, Y, Z]

to [x, y, z]. What kind of transformation is this?



Chromaticity

Two characteristics of this transformation.

1. Any color that has the same X:Y:Z ratio will be mapped to the same point.

• What points will have the same X:Y:Z ratio?

2. Given that x+y+z=1, all the transformed points are now on the same plane.

 $x = \frac{X}{X + Y + Z}$ $y = \frac{Y}{X + Y + Z}$ $z = \frac{Z}{X + Y + Z}$



The Geometry of Chromaticity

We've effectively projected all the colors onto the same plane using what's called the **perspective projection**, which is exactly what a (pinhole) camera does.

xy-Chromaticity Plot

Since x+y+z=1, we need only two components to represent a color. That is, we can represent colors in a 2D space (except we lose the intensity information).

Plot the locus in a 2D xy plot. z is implicit (i.e., z = 1 - x - y).



Interpreting the xy-Chromaticity Plot

- The **curve** is the spectral locus.
- Points on locus: spectral light.
- Connect two points on the locus: all the colors that are can be produced from mixing those two spectral lights.
 - Because any point on a line segment is a positive linear combination of the two end points.





Interpreting the xy-Chromaticity Plot

Points **inside locus**: colors of nonspectral lights. They can be produced from some combination of other lights.

Points **outside locus** are imaginary colors; can't be produced from any combination of real lights.

The area enclosed by the spectral locus represents the **gamut of human visual system** — all the colors we can see.

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Gamut of a Color Space

Colors outside the triangle but inside the spectral locus are real colors, but they can't be physically produced by mixing the primary lights of this color space.



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> Color that can't be produced from this RGB color space



A Fascinating Fact

No color space made of physically real lights can reproduce all visible colors.

- No matter how many primaries are used in the color space.
- Why? Can you give the intuition?





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The locus is **convex**. No polygon whose vertices are on or inside the spectral locus can cover the interior of the locus.





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The locus is **convex**. No polygon whose vertices are on or inside the spectral locus can cover the interior of the locus.

No display can display all the colors.





Typical Visualization

lt's a lie.

Technically we shouldn't color the entire gamut, since no display can display all those colors. Usually people find the closest displayable colors to show there.

Colors at the center are "white-ish"; they are mixed from relatively equal amount of other colors. More on white colors later.

Color Cube (a.k.a., Build Your Own Color Space)



What is a Color Cube?

In usual graphing applications we specify color by three integers, each between 0 and 255, or as a sixdigit HEX value. For instance:

- Black [0, 0, 0] / 0x000000
- White [255, 255, 255] / 0xFFFFFF
- Red [255, 0, 0] / 0xFF0000
- Some sort of gray [146, 146, 146] / 0x929292

Intuitively, it allows us to specify a color as a mixture of three primary colors. The numerical value represents how much of a primary color we want.

How to Build a Color Cube?

We need to define the color space first.

• Surprisingly, we need not only the three primaries, but also the white point.

We will then figure out how to quantize the color space: there are infinitely many colors in a color space, but we can afford to represent only 2^{24} colors.

- Assuming 8 bits per primary (color channel).
- There are encodings that use more bits per channel.

What is White?

Intuitively: equal amount of maximum primary lights in a color space is white. • So the notion of "white" is specific to a color space.

Color Temperature

The colors of black body radiation under different temperatures form a curve when plotted in the xy-chromaticity diagram. It's called the Planckian locus.

A color on the locus has a color temperature.

Color Spaces in Chromaticity

D65 is the most commonly used white.

sRGB is the most common color space, but its gamut is very small.

CMYK is used in printers. More later.

ProPhoto RGB is a conceptual color space; its primaries are not real colors.

All RGB color spaces are just one linear transformation away from each other.

Quantize the Color Cube

The color space so far is continuous, but we have to discretize/quantize the space since we have limited bits. Popular sRGB color space uses 8 bits per primary. That is, we can represent at most 2²⁴ colors.

Even quantization? Uneven? What's the criterion?

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Ideally, we want to evenly divide the brightness.

• Increasing **R** from 0 to 1 should add the same amount of perceived redness as increasing **R** from 240 to 241.

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Does our perceived brightness increase uniformly with light power?

Thought Experiment

Compare the following two scenarios:

- Walking into a completely dark room and turn one light on
- Walking into a room with 10 lights already on and turn on one more light

In which scenario would you feel a stronger brightness increase? Brightness vs. power relationship isn't linear.

Power vs. Perceived Brightness

Luminous efficiency function

The logarithmic relationship between subjective sensation and objective physical stimulus intensity is called the "Weber-Fechner law".

• Pain, hearing, taste, etc.

Gamma Color Encoding

Assuming after linear transformation, R/G/B are in the [0, 1] range

$$R_{8bit} = \lfloor R^{\frac{1}{2.2}} \times 255 \rfloor$$
$$G_{8bit} = \lfloor G^{\frac{1}{2.2}} \times 255 \rfloor$$
$$B_{8bit} = \lfloor R^{\frac{1}{2.2}} \times 255 \rfloor$$

Gamma used by sRGB

* sRGB actually uses a piece-wise gamma

Color Cube

Colors on vertices have equal mix of 2 or 3 primaries with maximum quantity.

Colors outside of the cube are either:

- physically unrealizable or
- realizable but can't be produced from the chosen primaries.

Additive vs. Subtractive Color Space

RGB color spaces are additive: adding multiple colors to form a new color.

• Good for generated lights (e.g., display)

Cyan material looks cyan because it absorbs red light.

- Cyan = White Red = Blue + Green
- Yellow = White Blue = Red + Green
- Magenta = White Green = Red + Blue

Subtractive Color Space: CMYK

Subtractive color space is better at describing reflected light, e.g., painting, printing.

• Paper has color because it absorbs lights of certain wavelengths.

Pure subtractive color space rarely reflects reality, because it assumes pure absorption. Actual materials scatter lights too. More later.

Color Spaces Designed For Displays

sRGB	
sRGB is a color space, developed jointly by Hewlett- Packard and Microsoft in 1996. It is used in different devices such as printers, displays, TV sets, cameras, etc. The sRGB color space covers about 72% of the NTSC color space.	≈ 99 % (percent)
Adobe RGB (1998)	
Adobe RGB (1998) is a color space, developed by Adobe Systems in 1998. It has a wider gamut than the sRGB (mainly in the cyan-green range of colors) and is widely used in professional printing.	≈ 73 % (percent)
DCI P3	
DCI P3 is a color space, introduced in 2007 by the SMPTE. It is used in digital cinema and has a much wider gamut than the sRGB.	≈ 75 % (percent)

Display native color space rarely matches exactly with an existing color space (manufacturing constraints).

The same pixel shown in three different color spaces. The RGB values in the display native space roughly match the values in the DCI P3 color space, but are very different from the values in the sRGB color space.

Matches the sRGB and DCI P3 gamuts pretty well, but not perfectly.

Perceptual Color Space

HSB/HSV/HSL: intuitive representation of RGB space

- Hue: "nuances" of color
- Saturation: purity
- Value/brightness/lightness: amount of color

HSB/HSV/HSL don't change the gamut; they just map a cube to a cylinder.

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MacAdam Ellipses

- Distances in the XYZ color space (and any RGB) color space) are not proportional to the actual color difference.
- Colors in the same MacAdam ellipses (in chromaticity plot) are perceptually the same.
