Course description In this course we introduce a number of tools with analytic flavor that have an impressive range of applications in computer science and discrete mathematics. Although the objects we are dealing with (such as graphs, sets, boolean functions, and various models of computation) are discrete in nature, it turns out that an analytic point of view—as opposed to a purely combinatorial one—provides a powerful lens to study these objects.

We start with elementary tools such as probabilistic concentration bounds and then move on to more advanced material such as spectral graph theory, discrete Fourier analysis, and pseudorandomness. Applications of these tools in areas such as algorithms, coding theory, complexity theory, discrete mathematics, and machine learning will be discussed.
