

 $|\alpha_i Q - p_i| \le 1/2$ trivial

Simultaneous Diophantine Approximation with an excluded prime

Given reals $\alpha_1, \alpha_2, ..., \alpha_n$ **prime** p**I integers** $r_1, ..., r_n$ **and** q

such that gcd(p,q) = 1 and

$$|q\alpha_i - r_i| \leq \varepsilon$$
 for all i

Simultaneous diophantine $\ensuremath{\mathcal{E}}$ -approximation excluding \ensuremath{p}

Not always possible

Example
$$p = 3$$

If $\alpha_1 = 1/3$ then $\varepsilon \ge |q\alpha_1 - r_1| = |q/3 - r_1| \ge 1/3$

Simultaneous diophantine $\ensuremath{\mathcal{E}}$ -approximation excluding $\ensuremath{\mathcal{P}}$

obstacle with 2 variables

If $\alpha_1 + 2\alpha_2 = 1/p$

then

$\mathcal{E} \ge |q\alpha_1 - r_1|$ $\mathcal{E} \ge |q\alpha_2 - r_2|$

 $3\varepsilon \ge |q(\alpha_1 + 2\alpha_2) - (r_1 + 2r_2)| \ge 1/p$



Simultaneous diophantine $\ensuremath{\mathcal{E}}$ -approximation excluding \ensuremath{p}

Theorem:

If there is no \mathcal{E} -approximation excluding p then there exists an obstacle with

$$\sum |b_i| \le n^{3/2} / \varepsilon$$

Kronecker's theorem ():

Arbitrarily good approximation excluding $\ensuremath{\mathcal{P}}$ possible IFF no obstacle.

Simultaneous diophantine $\ensuremath{\mathcal{E}}$ -approximation excluding $\ensuremath{\mathcal{P}}$

obstacle with


$$\sum |b_i| \le n^{3/2} / \varepsilon$$

necessary to prevent \mathcal{E} -approximation excluding p

sufficient to prevent $\frac{\mathcal{E}}{pn^{3/2}}$ -approximation excluding p

gcd(x,m) = 1


stretching by \mathcal{X}

 $Ax = \{ax \mid a \in A\}$



Shrinking modulo a prime

If *m* a prime then

every small set can be shrunk


Shrinking modulo a prime

m a prime

d = |A|

there exists x such that arc-length of $Ax \leq m^{1-1/d}$

proof:




Shrinking modulo any number



m a prime \longrightarrow every small set can be shrunk


If gcd(x,m) = 1

Where does the proof break?


$$m = 2^k$$

need: approximation excluding 2



Shrinking cyclotomic classes



set of interest – cyclotomic class (i.e. the set of r-th roots of unity mod m)

- locally testable codes


Dual lattice

$$L^* = \{ u | (\forall v \in L) v^T u \in \mathbb{Z} \}$$

gaussian weight of a set

$$\rho(A) = \sum_{x \in A} e^{-\pi \|x\|^2}$$

mass displacement function of lattice $\phi_L(x) = \rho(L+x) / \rho(L)$



discrete measure

$$\sigma_L(A) = \rho(L \cap A) / \rho(L)$$

relationship between the discrete measure and the mass displacement function of the dual

$$\widehat{\sigma}_L(x) = \phi_{L^*}(x)$$


$$\widehat{\sigma}_L(x) = \frac{1}{\rho(L)} \sum_{y \in L} \exp(-\pi \| y \|^2) \exp(2\pi i y^T x)$$

discrete measure defined by the lattice

$$\sigma_L(A) = \rho(L \cap A) / \rho(L)$$

$$\widehat{\sigma}_L(x) = \phi_{L^*}(x)$$

$$\widehat{\sigma}_{L}(x) = \frac{1}{\rho(L)} \sum_{y \in L} \exp(-\pi ||y||^{2}) \exp(2\pi i y^{T} x)$$



there is no short vector $w \in L$ with coefficient of the last column $\neq 0 \pmod{p}$

Banasczyk's technique (1992) there is no short vector $w \in L$ with coefficient of the last column $\neq 0 \pmod{p}$ $\hat{\sigma}_L(u) \ge 1/2$ $u := \frac{c}{n \sqrt{n}} e_{n+1}$ $\phi_{L^*}(u) \ge 1/2$ $\dim(u, L^*) \le \sqrt{n}$ obstacle



Lovász (1982) Simultaneous Diophantine Approximation

Given rationals
$$lpha_1, lpha_2, ..., lpha_n, Q$$

can find in polynomial time

integers
$$p_1, ..., p_n$$
 $0 < q \le Q$
 $|q\alpha_i - p_i| \le \frac{2^{n^2}}{Q^{1/n}}$ for all i

Factoring polynomials with rational coefficients.

Simultaneous diophantine $\mathcal E$ -approximation excluding $p \$ - algorithmic

Given rationals $\alpha_1, \alpha_2, ..., \alpha_n$,prime p

can find in polynomial time

 $2C_{n+1}p\mathcal{E}$ -approximation excluding p

where \mathcal{E} is smallest such that there exists \mathcal{E} -approximation excluding \mathcal{P} $C_n = 4\sqrt{n}2^{n/2}$

Exluding prime and bounding denominator

 $b_1 \alpha_1 + b_2 \alpha_2 + \dots + b_n \alpha_n = 1/p + t + \kappa$ $|\kappa| \le n/Q$

Exluding prime and bounding denominator

the obstacle


necessary to prevent \mathcal{E} -approximation excluding p with $q \leq Q$

sufficient to prevent $\varepsilon/(2n^{3/2}p)$ -approximation excluding p with $q \le Q/(2pn)$

Exluding several primes

If there is no \mathcal{E} -approximation excluding $p_1, ..., p_k$ then there exists

obstacle with $\sum_{i} |b_i| \le n^{1/2} (\max(n,k)) / \mathcal{E}$



Algebraic integers?

possible that a small integer combination with small coefficients is doubly exponentially close to 1/p
